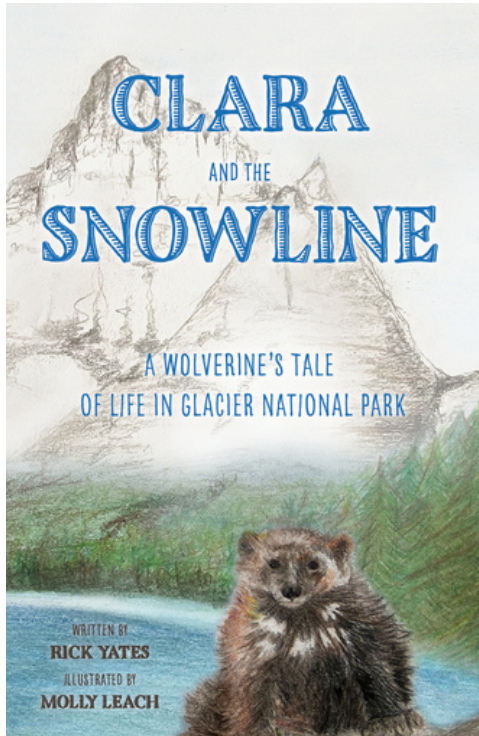

Born beneath deep winter snow in Glacier National Park, wolverine kit Clara enters a world of relentless cold, scarce food, and constant danger. She will face wolves, golden eagles, and grizzlies. She will lose her brother to a glacial crevasse and learn to survive alone in one of North America's most unforgiving wilderness areas.

But Clara is a wolverine. Fierce, fearless, and built for exactly this. Based on five years of hands-on field research by wildlife biologist Rick Yates, *Clara and the Snowline* follows one wolverine through every season of high-country life, from her first glimpse of daylight to a territory of her own. Grounded in science and rich with authentic detail, this is narrative natural history at its most immersive: honest about the brutality of wild survival, and generous with its wonder.

Featuring pencil illustrations by Molly Leach, *Clara and the Snowline* is for readers ages 8–12 and the adults who read alongside them.

As a wildlife biologist, Rick Yates has conducted field research on bald and golden eagles, peregrine falcons, common ravens, gray wolves, grizzly bears, and wolverines. He has spent several decades working in and exploring the wildlands of Glacier National Park and surrounding national forests. For five years, he worked as the field coordinator on a wolverine ecology project in Glacier. He is retired from the U.S. Forest Service and lives with his wife near Whitefish, Montana. This is his first book.

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
